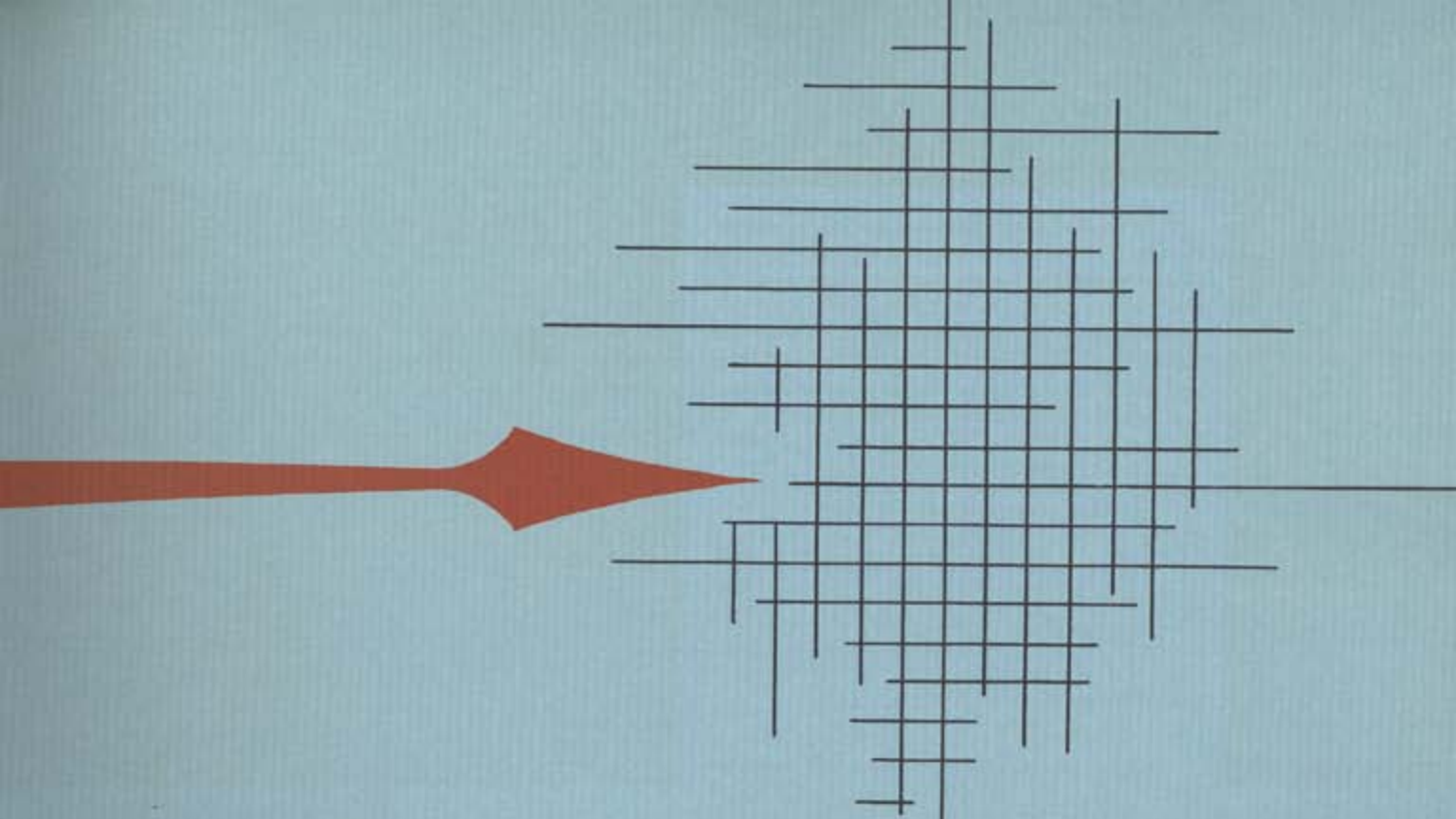

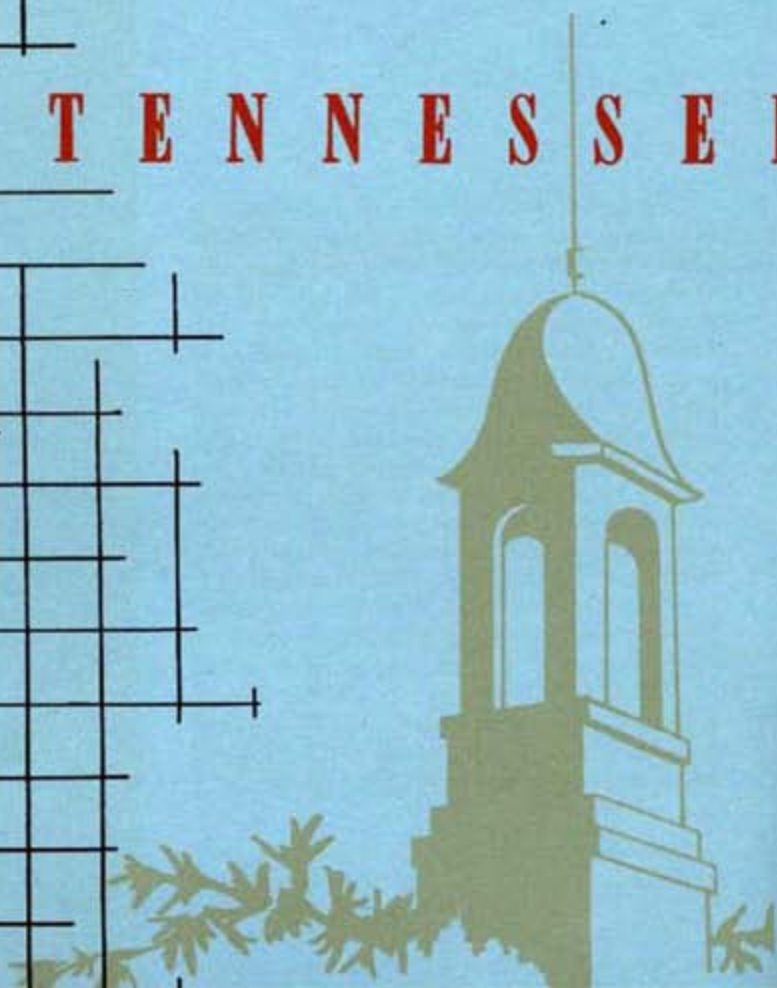

Located in Nashville, the capital city of TENNESSEE, the welfare of the University is guarded over by the governor and the State Board of Education.

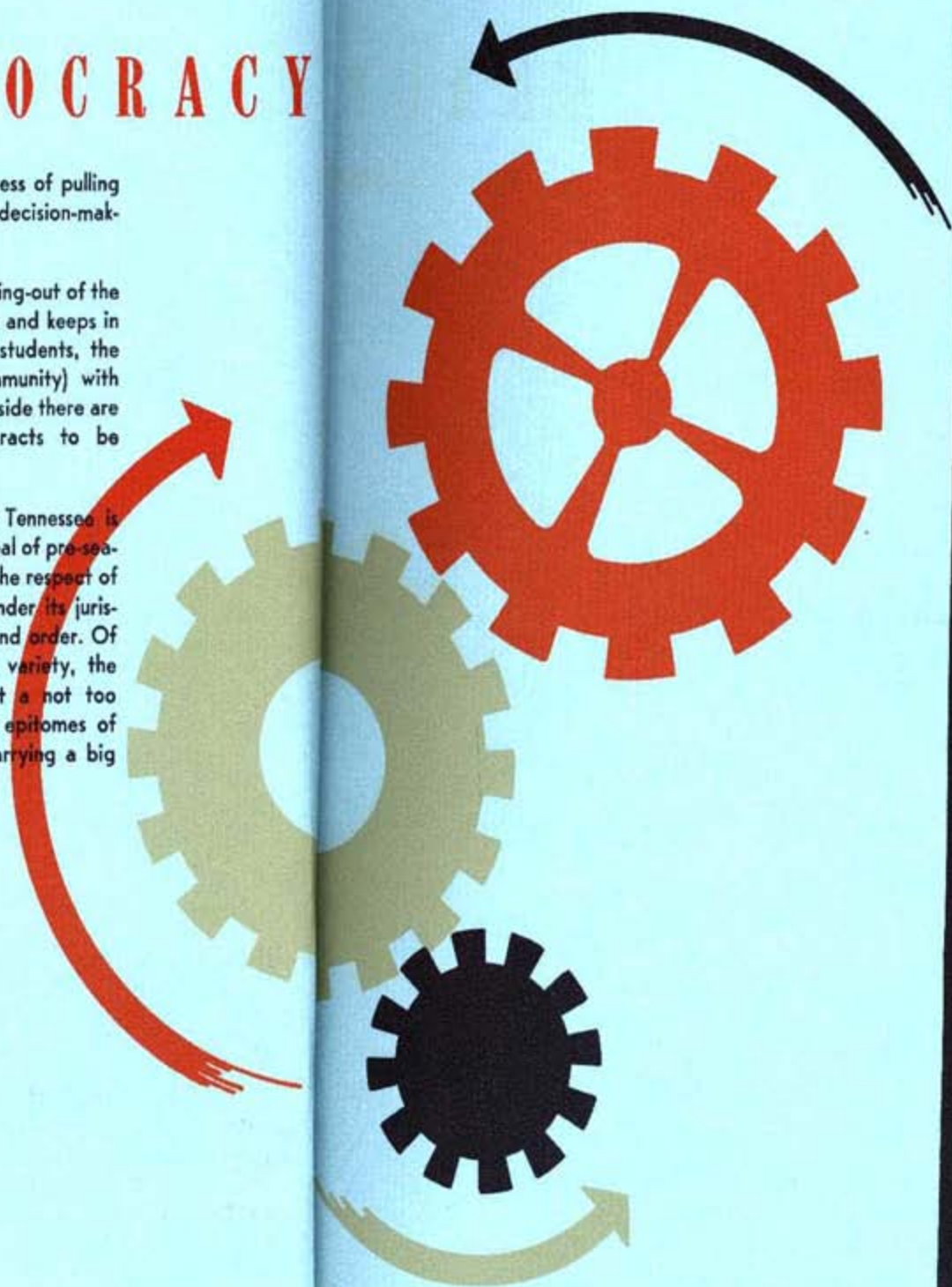

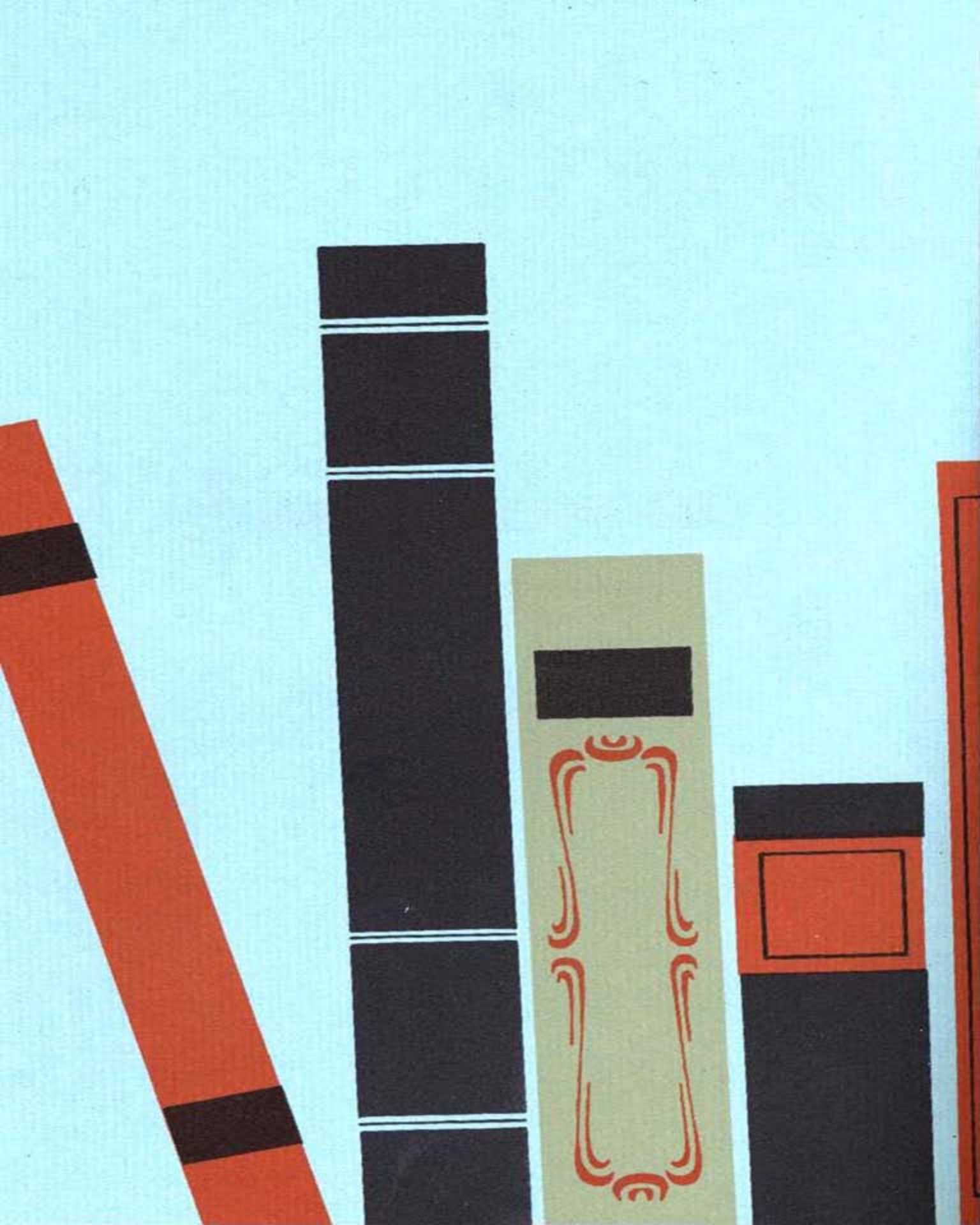
# TRANSILLUMINATION

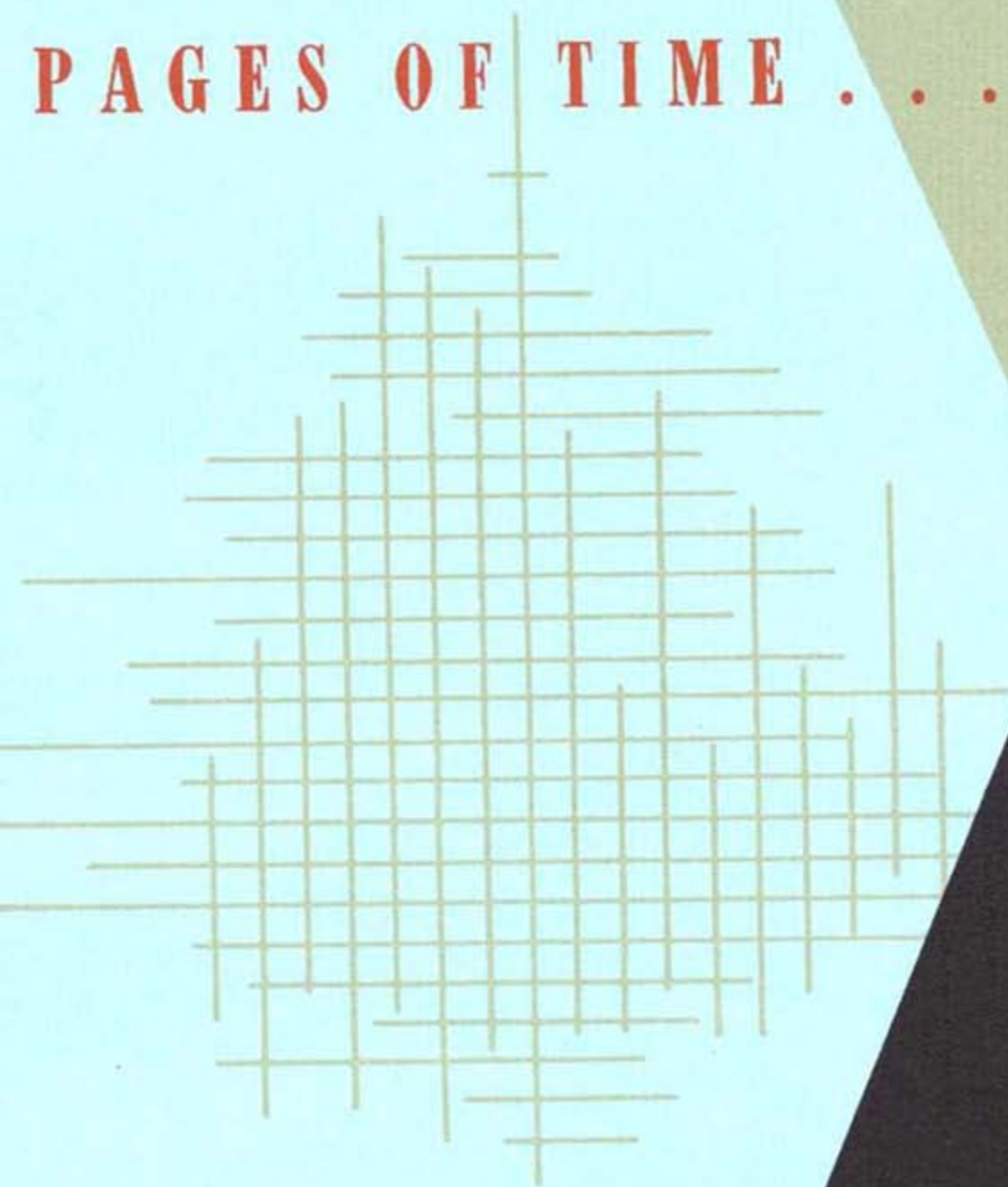

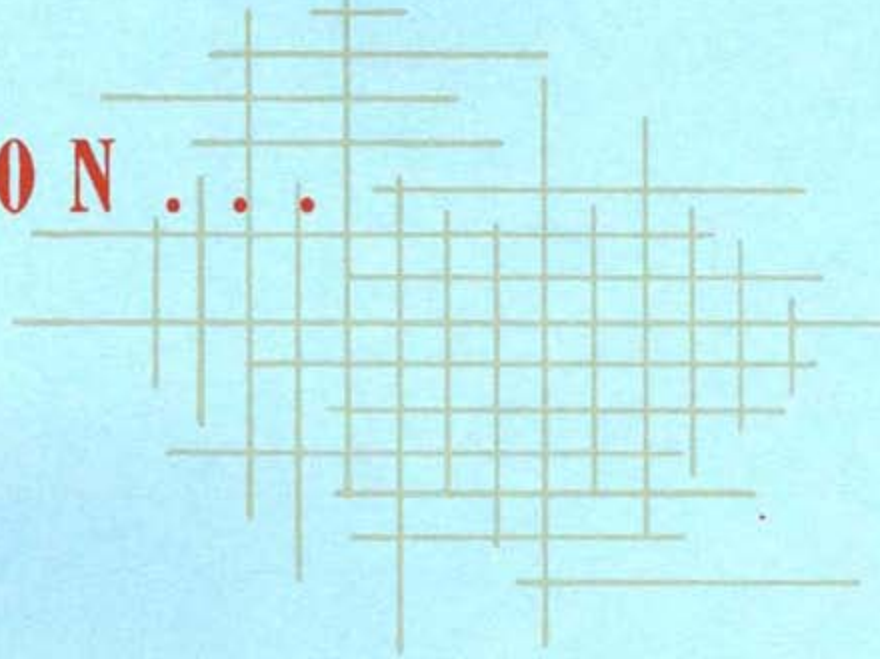
# DEDICATION . . .

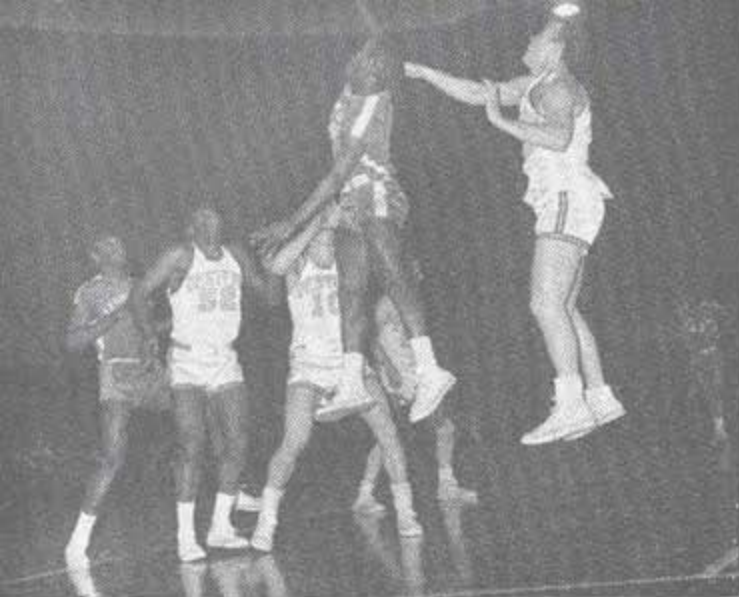

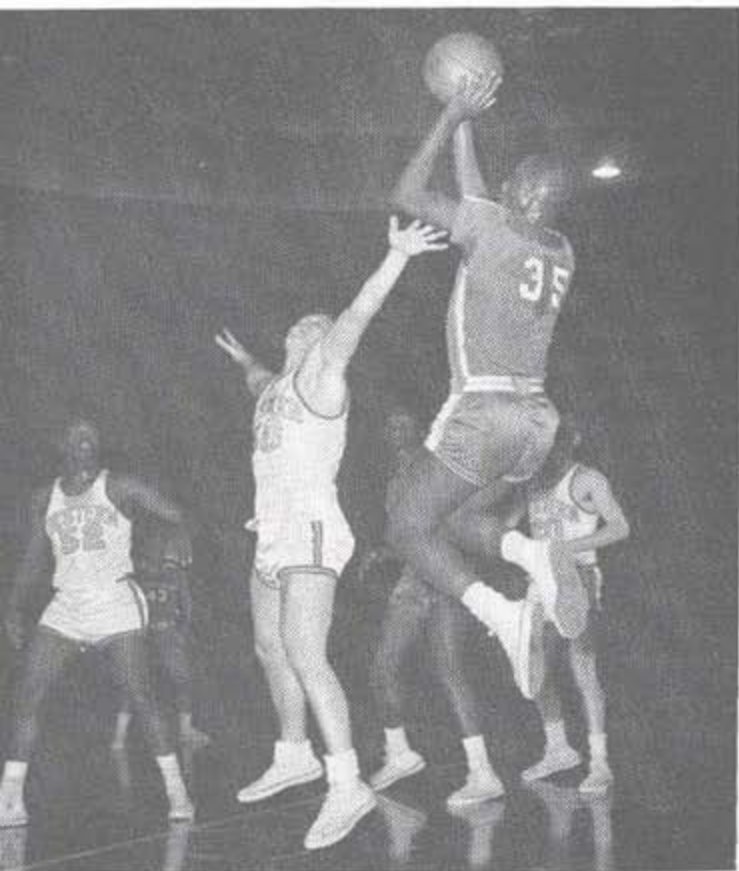

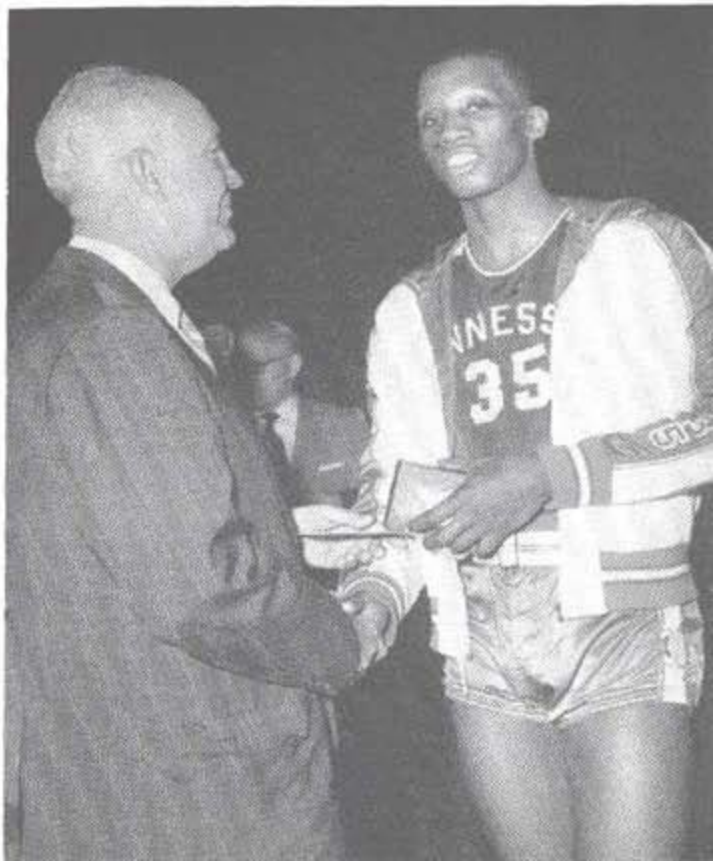

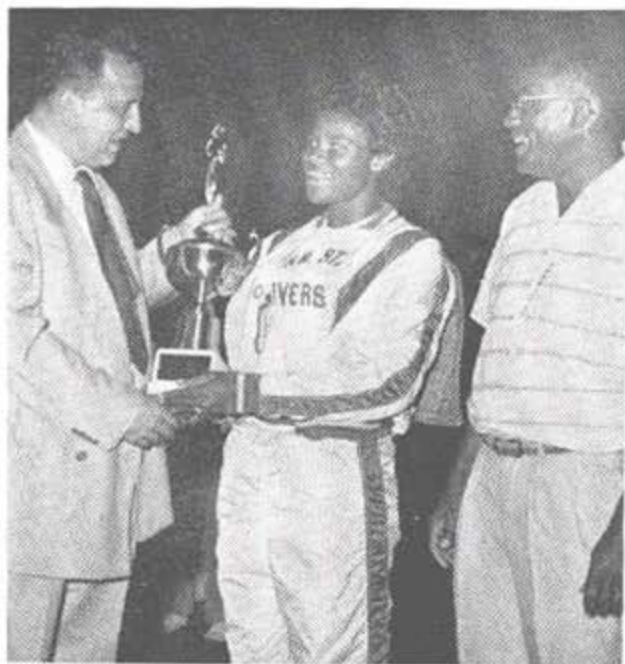

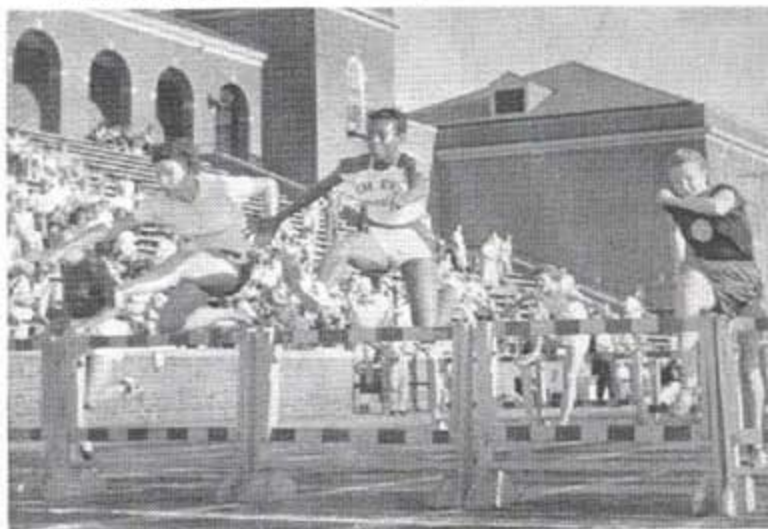
A first for Tennessee . . . Miss Crowder captures the hurdles

Again this past summer, Tennessee's Olympic sprinkled Tigerbelles copped the AAU national crown with a whopping 143 points. This was Tennessee's third straight clean sweep [junior and senior divisions]. While bossing the best in America for the third time, Tennessee's cinder path speedsters blasted three records. This track mastery drew an invitation from Cuba for the Tigerbelles to diploay their cinder path style at the Cuban national festival at Havana October 10.

The Edward S. Temple-coached, jet assisted sprintsters so out-classed the AAU field that Tennessee's blue and white took all six places in the half-century race, captured first, second, third, and fifth places in both the 100 and 220 yard runs; in addition, they bossed the 440 yard relay, broad jump and hurdles.

Over the five-year span, the Temple-coached girls have done a fine lifting job on AAU and American track record books. And now the Tigerbelles were faced with the task of bettering their own times. Atlanta-born Margaret Matthews opened the final's by erasing Stella Walsh's 19-year-old AAU broad jump with a 19 feet, 5/2 inch leap, to start the assault on the record books.

With an ailing ankle, Isabelle Daniels turned in a blistering 220 yard run. Her 0:24.7 was under the 0:25.1 set by ex-teammate Mae Faggs in 1955. But it was Temple's 440 yard relay flying quartet (Daniels, Matthews, Barbara Jones, and Wilma Rudolph) who brought down the house. Pushed by teammates (Tennessee's B team) the Tigerbelle senior quartet aided by perfect baton passing, clipped the 440 tape in 0:47.1 and a brand new mark in the final run for the records in the 1957 national AAU outdoor championships.

Previously overshadowed by their female counterparts the Tennessee State "Tiger Thinclads" came out for a little of the publicity this year.

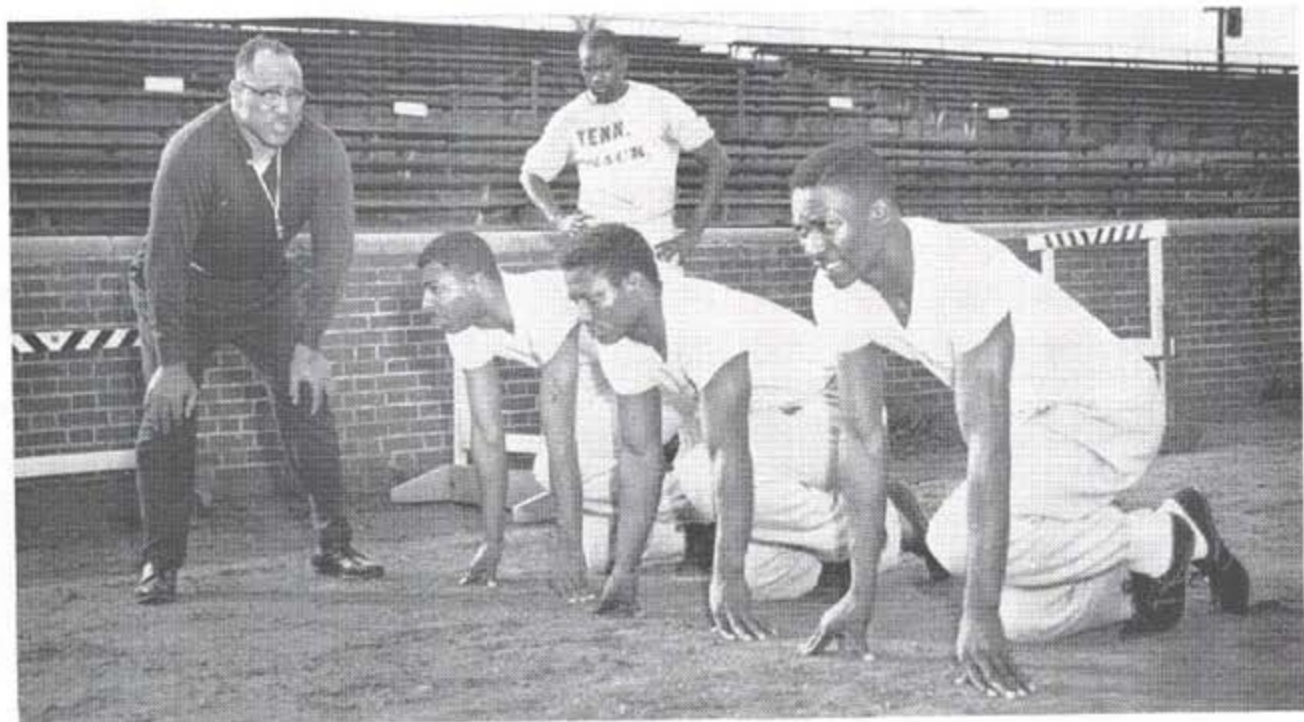
Under the brilliant leadership and guidance of their new coach, Raymond H. Kemp, the Thinclads went on to win the Mid-Western Conference title for the first time.

On the second weekend in April the Thinclads journeyed to Atlanta, Georgia where they won the Atlanta Relays, taking first place in every event except the 100 yard dash and the 220 yard dash. (The team placed second in each of these.) The following weekend found the Thinclads in Montgomery, Alabama for the Alabama Relays where they took

first places in the 120 yard high hurdles and the 220 yard low hurdles. After winning the Tennessee Relays, here at home with flying colors, the Thinclads were off to Central State College at Wilberforce, Ohio to compete in track events leading to the Mid-Western championship title.

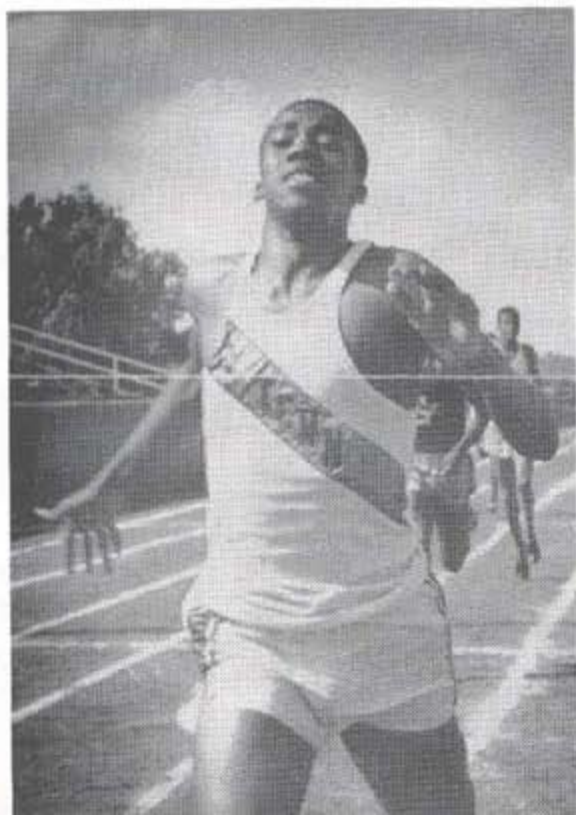

## STEVE'S BIG YEAR . . .

On July 28, Willie Stevens of the A. and I. team and star hurdler in many circles, was chosen to represent the United States in a series of track meets in Europe and the Scandinavian countries. He competed in Berlin, Germany where he ran a 14.1 seconds in the high hurdles. Steve's next stop was Sweden where he competed in ten meets WINNING THEM ALL. Best time for the Tiger thinclad champ was made in Gavle, Sweden, and Boros, Sweden where he posted times of 13.6 twice, erasing the 20 year old Swedish record as well as the country's stadium record. During his overseas sojourn Stevens, on eight different occasions, was successful in erasing records from the books that had stood for years.

Making his way to Oslo, Norway, Stevens again made with the hills, topping the timbers at 13.6 and coming within two-tenths of a second of the world's record.

Steve's last stop before returning to the States was Denmark where he again ran 13.6 setting off the sparks for his 100 meter run in 10:6 and his broad jump distance of 24 feet 2 inches. Just 2 feet 8 inches shy of the world's record this is a very respectable distance for a man who is not a broad jumper.

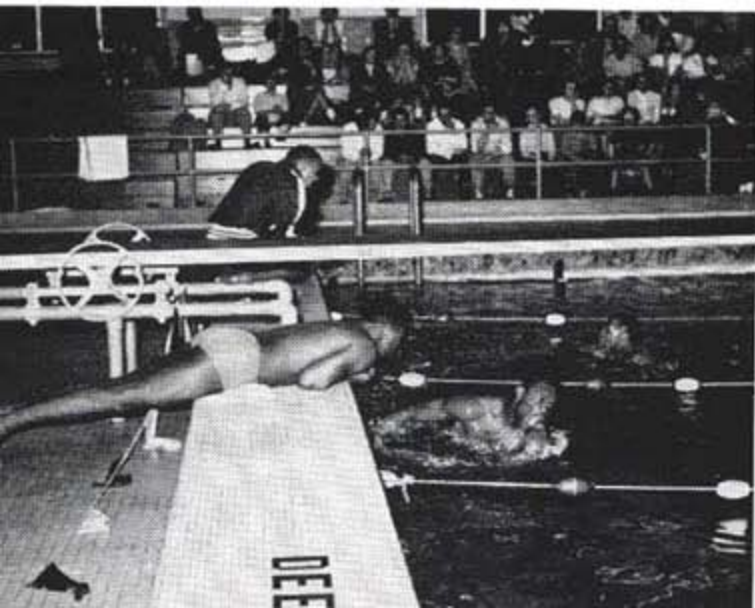

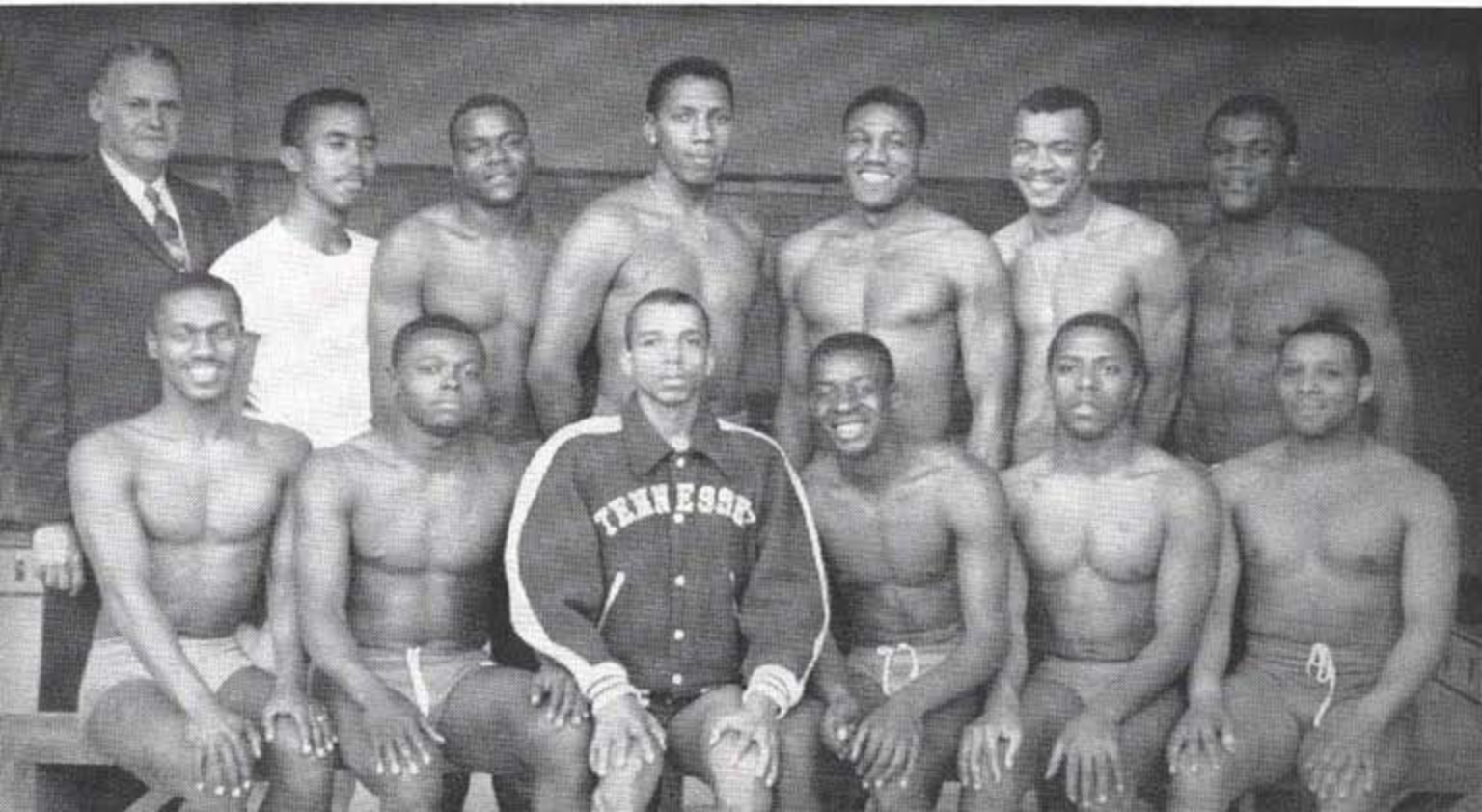

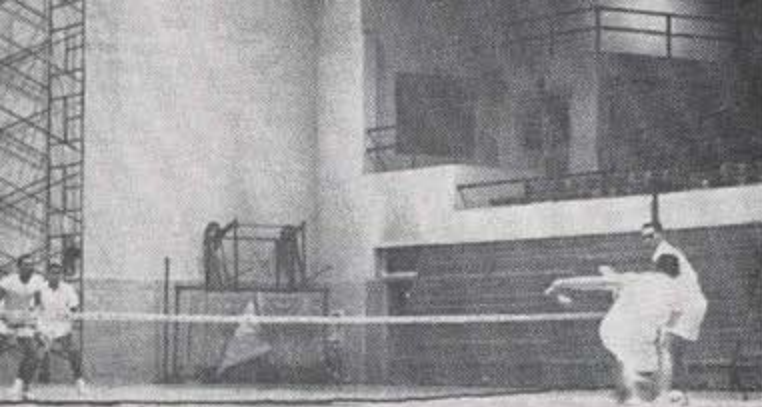
Other pool records set by A. & I.'s slippery tigersharks during the 1957-58 season are as follows:

400-yard medley relay, 4:31 at Central State College on January 11. 400-yard medley, 4:34.2; 200-yard butterfly, 2:41; and 200-yard breaststroke, 2:38.2 at West Virginia State on January 13. At Fairmont State in West Virginia the sharks set six pool records with the time of 4:28 in the medley relay; 4:04 in the 400-yard relay; :25 in the 50-yard dash; a cool 2:38 in the 200-yard butterfly; the time of 57.8 in the 100-yard freestyle and 2:31.3 in the 200-yard breaststroke.

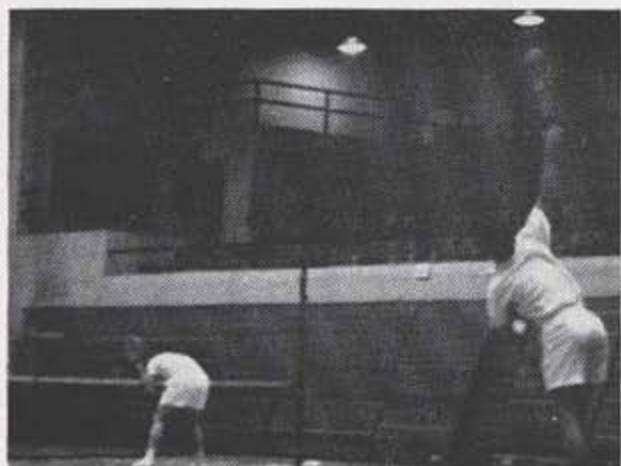
