



The composition, framing point of view of the entire presentation, is designed to relive and refresh our emotional recollection of feelings, impressions, and images captured during this school year.


















DR. A. V. BOSWELL

#### state gridmen suffer worst season in years

Nashville . . . . . . . . Head coach, Howard Gentry, used every trick-of-the-trade in an effort to maintain the outstanding position in football that has prevailed throughout the history of Tennessee State University.

Harassed with numerous injuries, only five returning seniors and a lack of overall experience within the ranks, the Tigers struggled through with a season's record of 4 wins and 4 defeats. The losses came at the hands of four of the top teams in the nation.

After downing a strong North Carolina A and T team 23-6, the Tigers kicked-off the home season by clawing Morris Brown 32-6 before the largest hometown opening crowd, 5,000 strong, in modern Tennessee State history. After this short taste of success, the Tigers fell to a powerful Grambling eleven 7-6 before a crowd of 9,000 enthusiasts.

Coach Gentry's boys then came back to crush Central State College 20-6 before dropping the season's thriller to Southern University before a capacity house in W. J. Hale Stadium 23-14. Then followed the defeats at the hands of Lincoln University and Jackson College 24-12 and 18-13 respectively. The Tigers rallied back to strangle Kentucky State College for a homecoming victory 19-6.

Highlighting the faltering Tennessee team was Gentry's defensive forward wall of Bennie Clay, Calvin Sorrells and Fred Metcalfe who kept the opponents in constant danger. This trio, along with the rest of the defensive team continually kept the Tigers in game.

Having little success on offense, The Tigers were spearheaded by senior co-captain Wilbur Suesberry. Gaining recognition on several All-America polls, the Tiger quarterback led the team in four departments. Halfbacks Billy Bentley and Andrew Earthman sparked the team in rushing and passreceiving respectively.

Tennessee's hardwood artists ended a great season by winning an unheard of third straight NAIA National Cage crown before 9,000 "well-show-me" fans.

For the season the Tigers impressively downed 32 opponents, losing only one, while capturing first place victories in five tournaments—Georgia Invitational, Quincy College Holiday Invitational, Mid-Western Conference, South-Central NAIA Tipoff and the NAIA National at Kansas City, Mo. Dubbed "pressure proof" by local scribes in the Kansas City area during that city's NAIA dribble derby, the last of the Whiz Kids topped 3 team tourney records and Dick "Skull" Banett became the all-time scoring leader besides being named the tourney's most valuable player and gathering his second streight Chuck Taylor trophy. The fabulous "Skull" ended his college career by being named to the all-tourney team for the third consecutive year.

Aided by the well-wishes of Tennessee's Governor, legislators and the university family, the Tigers set many records-scoring 150 points against Knoxville College for a school record in regular season play; setting an unofficial highest percentage of 70.5 in the semi-finals (NAIA); most consecutive games (15) and most points in a single NAIA game (131). The Whiz Kids were the first collegians to win three consecutive NAIA championships. The Whiz Kids, paced by the "Skull" were superb all season. Barnett scored 48 points in the Lincoln game for an individual reagular season record, scoring 3,193 points for his four-year collegiate career and 963 points this season. He is the all-time NAIA scoring champion with 462 points for a career tournament score, Captain John Barnhill and Dick Barnett were named to the NAIA All-Tournament team. The Tigers led the UPI ratings as the number one small college in the nation for eleven weeks, and were ranked sixteenth among all colleges in the nation at the end of the season, Dick "Skull" Barnett was named to the AP and UPI first team All-American. 




#### tigerbelles retain world status

Eyes of the track world turned to Moscow to witness America's quest for world domination in women's track. Contributing heavily to America's hopes was a small aggregate of young ladies from a small campus bordering the Cumberland River.

Coached by one of the rising figures in collegiate track, Edward S. Temple, the Tigerbelles defied the skeptics, who prophesied utter defeat for the U. S. Cinderbelles, to capture four of ten first places. Running before more than a half-million spectators, Tigerbelle Barbara Jones nipped the 100 meter pack with a 11.6 in a race where two crossed the tape in exactly the same time. Isabelle Daniels took third.

Lucinda Williams took the 200 in 24.4 with Daniels third with a 24.5, and the Tigerbelle relay team, Daniels, Williams, Matthews, and Jones, annexed the 400 meter relay that accounted for the Tigerbelles' efforts against the strongest competition in the world today.

Leaving Russia, the Tigerbelles bossed the 100, 200, 400, meter relays and broadjump in Poland, Hungary and Greece winning hundreds of friends in the State Department AAU sponsored goodwill tour.


#### WASHINGTON

Traveling to Washington, D. C., the Tigerbelles displayed great form in running away with the lion's share of laurels in the national Women's AAU indoor track championship. The Tennesseans rolled up 61½ points while their strongest competitors were New York's Queen Mercurettes and Police Athletic League each scoring 18.

It was A & I's fifth straight indoor AAU team title. The Tigerbelles also have won the last four times in the summer AAU outdoors meets. First place wins for the Tigerbelles came in the 50, 100 and 220-yard dashes, 70-yard hurdles, standing broad jump and 400-yard medley relay competition, plus lesser awards in other events.


Margaret Matthews breaks the tape at the Washington Evening Star Indoor Track meet.





Poised and ready are the 1958-59 edition of the Tigersharks. Coach is Thomas H. "Friend" Hughes.






Forced into a rebuilding program through losses by graduation, Coach Thomas Hughes' 1959 Tigersharks worked insatiably to shape-up a team that smashed eight pool records in a single dual meet.

Sparked this season by returning letterman and NAIA 200 yard butterfly champion, John Swann, the Tennessee tankmen ended the regular season with a nifty 4-1 record. Freshman, Roland Chatman, quickly rose to prominence by repeatedly capturing the 220 and 440 yard free style events cracking two pool records in one meet.


The Tigersharks began the season by routing West Virginia State 67-15, grabbing off seven of nine first places. Then traveling to Kentucky, the tankmen overwhelmed Berea (Continued on Page 199)




College 62-24 splashing two new pool records. Ball State College snapped the Tiger win streak in a nip-and-tuck battle 47-39.

Rebounding from their lone defeat, Coach Hughes' wavebeaters again swamped West Virginia State 61-14 before a packed opening home-season crowd. The Tigersharks rounded out their regular season by traveling to Atlanta only to break eight pool records in a recently opened pool and polishing off Moorehouse College 61-25, but post-season NAIA laurels were not in the making for them this year.

In recent years Tennessee State's men's track feam has emerged as a perpetual danger to all foes. Through the unyielding efforts of coach Ray Kamp, the Tigerclads have persistently developed into collegiate prominence.

The Tigers highlighted the season's action by winning their second consecutive Mid-West Athletic association track and field championship with a total of 58½ points. The closest opponent was Lincoln (Mo.) with 56½, Returning to the Drake Relays, coach Kemp's boys walked away with two championships. First, the quarter-mile relay team ran a dazzling 41.7 seconds. The same team of Tom Torian, Vero West, Ed Adams, and John Moon returned later to amaze the spectators by shattering the meet record in 1:25.6.

Before the Tigerclads were truly recognized by the track world, coach Kemp had realized that he was working with two possible Olympic stars. Ralph Boston, and John Moon have consistent displayed unusual form on the cinders. Moon is a dash-man and hes been clocked at 9.3 in the century in practice. Boston has repeatedly mastered the field events and "is a potential decathlon performer," stated coach Kemp.


Traveling to Montgomery the cinderburners dethraned Florida A&M as Alabama State relays champion. The Tigers won the 14th annual track carnival with 66 points to runnerup A&M's 57. Alcorn and Jackson colleges also felt the fangs of the Tigerclads in a tri-angular meet in which the boys from Tennessee amassed a total of 981/2 points.

Running up a total of 93½ points, the Kemp-wonders snatched an exciting win from Kentucky State and Central State: the former getting 21½ points and the latter 46¼. Moon received invitations to the NAIA track and field meet in San Diego, and the National AAU track and field championships at Bakersfield, California, and performed well though unable to grab-off a first place.








PEOPLE WHO GOT TO CANTON EARLIER WENT COON AND POSSUM HUNTING
