CLASS HISTORY

There arrived at Tennessee State College in the fall of 1942 380 green freshmen, the first class to enter college under the actual strain of World War II. What was college to be like? Would we find new friends? Would we be able to stay away from home for nine months? These were some of the questions to which we anxiously awaited answers. After a while Uncle Sam drafted several boys of the class, making the proportion of the female population of the college much greater than ever before. The road was a little rough, and some of the girls decided that college was not the life for them and chose other careers.

Even though several of the original class did not return for the second year, there were 165 sophomores in the fall of 1943. We had acquired a few privileges. For instance, we were allowed to move in front of the freshmen when the lines were formed for the meals in the cafeteria. The calls came to us for participation in the usual programs sponsored by the sophomore class. Some of our class members had distinguished themselves in the various departments of the college, and several had even made prominent social clubs and Greek organizations.

Now we have acquired the air and dignity of a junior-138 strong. Some of the A. & I. sons and daughters who have made the honor roll of the Armed Services have returned to complete their work as members of our class. With a little more interest and labor on our part and encouragement from our most honored advisers, Mr. Merl R. Eppse and Dr. Thomas E. Poag, we shall do great things as seniors and in the world of tomorrow.



2. Students who wish to become certified in the field of health and physical education.


3. Students who desire to become certified in other fields and must pursue certain fundamental health courses.



HISTORY

A meeting on January 14, 1913, in Minor Hall, at Howard University, was the nucleus of the Greek letter organization, later known as the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority. The purpose of this meeting was to secure permission of the university authorities and to draw up constitutions and by-laws. On the twenty-second day of the same month, the sorority was formally organized. For almost a year this first chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority lived and grew through additions from the several classes of the university.

Alpha Chi Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority was established on A. and I. State campus May 15, 1936, with seven young college ladies. This chapter is nationally known for the presentation of its annual "Jabberwock," which is an imaginary creature, so called because of the many different parts of other animals which are needed to make him sufficiently fascinating. The proceeds from the Jabberwock are awarded in the form of a scholarship to the freshman young woman having the highest scholastic average for four years of high school work. Miss Willie Dean DeBow, of Lebanon, Tennessee, was the recipient of the scholarship in 1943.

Although Alpha Chi is the youngest Greek letter organization on the A. and I. State College campus, the chapter was awarded the silver loving cup by the History Study Club for outstanding cultural contributions for the years 1941-42, 1942-43, 1943-44, and 1944-45.

The sorority sponsors an essay contest for high school students in connection with the college History Study Club program during Negro History Week.


An all-college variety show was sponsored by Alpha Chi for the war casualties at Thayer General Hospital. Other Delta features at A. and I. State College include the following: Vesper and Sunday school programs, chapel services, annual picnic, and the annual spring dance.

Alpha Chi Chapter plays a vital part in the campus life of A. and I. State College and is merely a link in the huge chain of the Delta Sigma Theta Sorority to uphold finer womanhood, scholarship, and service to the Negro race.








The Future Business Leaders of America of Tennessee State College was organized as Chapter No. 27 in the fall of 1941.











FAMOUS CONCERT SINGERS

For more than ten years the Concert Singers under the direction of Mrs. Marie Brooks-Strange have carried their songs of good will throughout the State of Tennessee, as well as into other states of the Union. It is by means of their fine contacts that State College has made new and lasting friends. In 1932 and 1933, they sang at the Chicago World's Fair, while thousands listened with enthusiasm. When Kagawa, the great Chinese educator, spoke to a packed house in Memphis some four years ago, these singers brought thunderous applause. St, Louis presented them in the large opera house during the meeting of the National Education Association in 1936. They appeared on the Tennessee Day program at the New York World's Fair, 1939, at which time they were broadcast over a nation-wide hookup, and again by return invitation in 1910. The singers again appeared in St. Louis, in February, 1940, at the meeting of the National Education Association, where in the Gold Room of the Jefferson Hotel they rendered a program for the American Association of Teachers Colleges. In June, 1940, the singers made a triumphal tour through the midwest which included engagements in Minneapolis, Minnesota, at the National Convention of the Kiwanis Clubs, in Chicago at the University of Chicago, and at other educational institutions in Illinois and Indiana.

Networks from coast to coast have picked up their Columbia Broadcasting programs. The group has had regular appearances on the program, "Song Time in Tennessee," On numerous occasions, individual artists, selected from the group, have been featured on the radio,

Tours throughout the state are annually scheduled by the singers, at which time they are invited to appear before college and university audiences. Concerts in the city of Nashville have included George Peabody College for Teachers, Vanderbilt University, Scarritt College, the Hermitage Hotel, the Andrew Jackson Hotel, Chamber of Commerce, and the meeting of the governors of Southern States at the governor's mansion.

The Concert Singers have sung to the late President of the United States, Mr. Franklin D. Roosevelt, and to four governors of Tennessee: Governor Hill McAlister, Governor Gordon Browning, Governor Prentice Cooper, and the present Governor Jim McCord.

The group receives the hearty cooperation of the President of the College, Dr. W. S. Davis, who believes in developing the individual's special aptitude to the fullest of his capabilities.

Mrs. Marie Brooks-Strange, able director of the singers, gives untiringly of her time and energy in order to inspire her chorus to still greater achievement. The following expression from one of the leading educators of America bespeaks the general enthusiastic attitude with which the group is received:


"Indeed, I cannot recall any program ever presented in this institution during the twenty years of my connection here which has ever called for so much enthusiastic response from the students and faculty as well. I was expecting a great deal from your group, but must confess that you exceeded even my highest expectations. The work you are doing in music at A. and I. State College ranks easily now among the high achievements of the Negro race in the United States, and I most warmly congratulate you and all others who have any part in this fine record."

The college cafeteria holds a unique place in the program of the school affairs. It is one of the many places on the campus that stands for efficiency and courteous service.

The reputation of successful management may be attributed to many causes. Until recently, Mrs. Janie Standback Elliott has devoted her unselfish service to the cause of making "mealtime a happy time." Since July, 1944, Mrs. Mary Randolph Hardy, a graduate of the college, has been in direct charge of the cafeteria, with Mrs. Elliott serving as consultant. Foods of the best quality are prepared by neat, clean, and interested men and women. The food is both attractive and wholesome, as special care is given not only to how it looks, but to the nutritive values to be received.

The cafeteria has not only served the students and faculty, but it has extended its service to personalities of national and international character. The legislature meets biennially in Nashville, at which time it has been the privilege of the college to entertain with a luncheon in their honor. This year they were entertained in a similar manner at dinner. Various organizations, including the New Farmers of America, the Y. W. C. A., the Tennessee Negro Education Association, National Conference of State Supervisors and Teacher Trainers in Agriculture and Home Economics, meetings of deans and registrars, national meetings of fraternities and sororities, Ministers Alliance, and others, have been served elaborate banquets in the college cafeteria. Visitors from all sections of the country have shared the hospitality of the cafeteria.

In our new regime under President W. S. Davis, a graduate of the college and former faculty member, the cafeteria is continuing its tradition of service and good will.


